Talking With Your Doctor

How well you and your doctor communicate with each other is one of the most important parts of getting good health care. Being prepared can help make the most of your visit. Here are some things you can bring:

- Lists of your concerns, any allergies and all the medicines, herbs, or vitamins you take, including dosages if possible
- A description of symptoms-when they started, what makes them better
- · A trusted friend or family member
- A way to take notes during your appointment

Make sure you understand your diagnosis and any treatments. Ask your health care provider to write down his or her instructions to you. If you still have trouble understanding, ask where you can go for more information.

During Your Appointment

Be Prepared and Ask Questions

You can make sure you get the best possible care by being an active member of your health care team. Being involved means being prepared and asking questions.

During your appointment, make sure to ask the questions you prepared before your appointment. Start by asking the ones that are most important to you.

To get the most from your visit, tell the nurse or person at the front desk that you have questions for your doctor. If your doctor does not ask you if you have questions, ask your doctor when the best time would be to ask them.

Understanding the answers and next steps

Asking questions is important but so is making sure you hear-and understand-the answers you get. Take notes. Or bring someone to your appointment to help you understand and remember what you heard. If you don't understand or are confused, ask your doctor to explain the answer again.

It is very important to understand the plan or next steps that your doctor recommends. Ask questions to make sure you understand what your doctor wants you to do.

The questions you may want to ask will depend on whether your doctor gives you a diagnosis; recommends a treatment, medical test, or surgery; or gives you a prescription for medicine.

You have the <u>right</u> to know how much care will cost <u>before</u> receiving care, both out of pocket and covered. You need to <u>ask!</u>

Questions could include:

- What is my diagnosis?
- What are my treatment options?
- Will I need a test? What is the test for? What will the results tell me?
- What will the medicine you are prescribing do? How do I take it? Are there any side effects?
- How much will my treatment cost?
- Can I be treated another way that is equally effective but less costly?
- Is there a generic or non-advertised equivalent available?
- Do I need to change my daily routine?

Did You Know?

Medical schools teach medical students how to talk with patients because the schools know how important doctor-patient communications is good for care.

OTHER HELPFUL TIPS

These steps will also help prepare for your appointment:

- Ask someone to go to your appointment with you to help you understand and remember answers to your questions
- Create a health history that includes your current conditions and past surgeries or illnesses. Bring it to your appointment
- Know your family's history, such as your parents' health conditions
- Bring all your medicines with you
- Keeping your out-of-pocket costs lower is all about location, location, location.
